- God has been at work in so many and varied ways throughout the year. Our prayer is that you continue looking to Him to help you move forward in your faith. To take the next step.


PLANS FOR 2024

New leaders in our team for Kids Church, which is headed up by Lizette Kotze has seen growth in numbers and in depth of Biblical Understanding.

Our Teen Bible Study split into two distinct groups and there has been growth in both.

One of our challenges is that we feel as if we are in constant competition with school events, for both children and leaders. Many of our leaders are very involved in sport and other activities at their respective schools and Friday nights are very popular school activity and sport match evenings. This is especially evident with winter sport in the 2nd and 3rd terms and

end of year events in the 4th term.

Please keep praying that God changes lives through Journey, that the regular children will be encouraged to invite their friends and that we can have an impact in the families of our community.

This means that instead of only seeing each grade once a term, I now get to visit each class twice every term and the same for Matthew with his older grades.

We have also been invited to share messages during assembly at Kenridge and Durbanville Prep this past year, including an assembly held especially for Ascension Day.

Overview

As 2023 draws to a close, we reflect on the progress and achievements in the facilities at Durbanville Baptist Church.

Some key points for the year:

1. Sanctuary Ceiling painting

Progress has been made towards the maintenance and repair of the sanctuary ceiling. After obtaining several quotes, the estimated cost for the project is approximately R60,000. We have already secured R11,000 towards this. However, as the church budget cannot cover the remaining amount, we are reaching out to our congregation for contributions to complete this vital maintenance to the sanctuary's interior.

2. Alternative Power Solutions

Our journey towards energy independence and efficiency has seen great developments:





- Solar Power Installation:



The success of the "Adopt a Panel" campaign has led to the installation of a solar array, effectively mitigating the impact of load shedding. Thanks again to all who contributed!

An additional lithium-ion battery is on order to further enhance the system's effectiveness against extended load shedding.

Plans include expanding the array to cover all the power phases of the church and installing additional inverters and panels.

The long-term goal is to sell excess power back to the city, making the installation cash positive over the medium term.

- Energy-Efficient Lighting:

We are in the process of replacing old fluorescent tubes with LED tubes in the offices and the vestry, and flat panel LED lighting in the sanctuary.

The hall lighting upgrade is planned for early 2024.

The main floodlights outside the church will be replaced with high-output LED floodlights by the end of 2023, with more LED floodlights to follow around the building.

3. Work Party

The Work Party on February 18 was a testament to the spirit of our church family. Many came to showcase their DIY skills, to maintain and improve the facilities. This event will be a recurring initiative in the coming years.







4. Future Projects and Planning

While 2023 was a year of focusing on immediate facility needs, we plan to give more attention to the planning of the expansion of buildings and manses in the upcoming year.



DBC Marriage Ministry

Overview

We had a good and encouraging start to the year after our elders' meeting late last year. In the 2nd term we were asked to present a talk on Friday night, mostly to the parents of children who are at youth. We used a video teaching by Gary Chapman on the importance of seeking Him, which ultimately makes a better marriage.



Unfortunately, in the 3rd term we did not have any event. Usually Focus on the Family has an event in

Cape Town which either we host as a church, or we promote heavily if it is held at another church but this year due to budget cuts at Focus, there was none. However, Elodee and I did attend a couple's weekend at "In Harmonie", a Christian retreat in Franschhoek. It was hosted by Focus on the Family with Grame Snell and his wife presenting. It was limited to 13 couples which made it quite intimate. Elodee and I had time to reflect on our marriage, and this gave us a chance to deal with some topics that we had skirted over the years.

The 4th term is the time for our usual marriage breakfast. It was quite a success based on the feedback we got, with 20 couples attending. There was only 20 minutes dedicated to "teaching" as we did not want people to feel that they were coming to another "how to fix your marriage" session but rather a marriage celebration event where we could celebrate the years of marriage we have had, and rejoice in our marriages.

<u>Challenges</u>

We still feel that nurturing/focusing on marriage is not a priority in our church congregation. We are not saying that people don't regard their marriage as important, but we get the feeling it is not prioritized. By the same token I don't suggest that every time we have an event that we have 100 couples attend, but we do find resistance to events. Even when we have the Focus on the Family events at our church (or other venues) the turnout from our church is very low. This was particularly evident with a course that was offered in the first term. When coupled with the general perceived lack of interest in marriage events, it did leave us quite unmotivated.

We also need the elders/deacons/pastors to play a more active role in the marriage ministry. We are always quite disappointed when our leaders and their wives don't make it to our events. We believe that as far as possible, they need to be there, to be an example for the Church. This past marriage breakfast had quite a few elders/deacons attend which was encouraging.

<u>Plans</u>

Working backwards: We plan to have a breakfast again in the 4th term of 2024. We are looking to do the Love & War series again in the 3rd term. In the 2nd term we will no doubt have another Friday night session at the church. The 1st term, at this stage, is open although we are looking at the book/course called, "How not to marry a jerk". It is very substantial course and while not pointedly Christian, the author is a believer, and the book follows Biblical principles. The challenge with this book is that you have to be accredited to even present the course, and it is very expensive. So, the 1st term is not settled yet.

Further, we want to introduce weekly communication in the DBC MailChimp. A short verse and encouragement or quote in a section specifically devoted to "Marriage matters."

We would also like the pastors to continue encouraging and promoting marriage in their sermons. We were very aware of the conscious effort that was made in the 1st and 2nd terms but since then it did seem to fizzle.

I, as deacon, also did drop the ball this year with regards to regular meetings with our marriage champions, especially the young adults. We met once and generated a lot of excitement, but then the challenges of the year got the better of me. I plan to rectify this by meeting at least once a term to talk, pray and plan so that they can be encouraged, and take that to their life groups.
